Chatelaine Nominee Finalist for Canada's Women of the Year 2011 - Shae Invidiata, Founder of [free-them]

Toronto, September 6th - Today, non-profit organization [free-them] announced that founder Shae Invidiata had been nominated by Canadian Women's Fashion Magazine Chatelaine as a Top Finalist for "Canada's Women of the Year 2011."

The award presented honours Canadian women under 30 years old for their achievements, influence and involvements in society in previous years, and recognizes the nominees as "the next generation of leaders in their fields".

Invidiata's nomination comes as a result of her imitative and dedicated work in bringing awareness of Human Trafficking - slavery today - and Sexual Exploitation in Canada and around the world. In October 2010, Invidiata directed the 1st Annual Walk for Freedom in Toronto. The monumental event was a great success drawing in over 300 participants, including Member of Parliament Joy Smith, who is Canada's leading politician that fights human trafficking in Canada, who marched through downtown Toronto in support of ending slavery today.

In Invidiata and her efforts through [free-them] support Mrs. Smith and her tireless efforts to strengthen Canada's Human Trafficking laws to protect our women and children. Invidiata and [free-them] helped to see Mrs. Smith's Bill C-268 receive Royal Assent in June 2010 which amended Canada's Criminal Code to prosecute traffickers caught trafficking minors with a mandatory minimum sentence of five years.

Again Invidiata is directing the [free-them] 2nd Annual Freedom Walk presented by Oliver & Bonacini Events at Toronto Board of Trade Sunday, September 18, 2011. "The Freedom Walk" is a part of a national and global campaign to bring awareness to the injustice of human trafficking.

This year [free-them] once again welcome honorable attendees: Member of Parliament Joy Smith, Sex Trafficking Survivor Timea Nagy, Constable Lepa Jankovic, Sex Trafficking Survivor Katarina MacLeod, Leading Founding Member of EVE Trisha Baptie, Sex Trade 101 Founder Natasha Falle, Miss Canada 2011 Tara Teng, and Canada's Women of the Year 2011 Chatelaine Nominee and [free-them] founder Shae Invidiata.

Most recently Invidiata has been nominated by Canadian Women's Fashion Magazine Chatelaine as a Top 20 Finalist for "Canada's Women of the Year 2011".
